



What are the duties of nurses and geriatric carers?

Geriatric nurses have duties in patient rehabilitation, therapy, general medical and nursing care: they help patients with their diet, personal hygiene, administer drugs, measure blood pressure and change bandages. They also support patients during leisure activities.

Healthcare nurses work in hospitals or care homes. They monitor patients' condition, assist doctors during examinations and prepare for operations. They also document the course of a patient's illness or medical condition.

How much do nurses earn in Germany?

Trainee nurses will get paid between €1,040 and €1,200 per month. The starting salary for fully-qualified healthcare nurses is around €2,500.

Cost of Studying

Compared to some of its neighbour countries, the cost of living in Germany is relatively inexpensive. On an average, an international student would need about 400 - 600 euros a month to cover living expenses, such as rent, food, clothing, books and others. It is good to note that this figure should be used only as a guide as factors like the city that you are living in. Your lifestyle choices will also determine your monthly expenditures. Unlike other countries where a student has to fork out tens of thousands of dollars to obtain a nursing degree, you are able to immediately start earning while doing apprenticeship in Germany.

The salary for trainee nurses ranges from 1,000 to 1,200 euros per month. Most partner universities or vocational schools do not charge any tuition fee but will require their students to contribute a small amount of money each semester. Other than covering administrative costs, the semester contribution is also used for student welfare such as funding student housing, sports and other facilities.

What form does nursing training take?

Training completes in three years. It is also possible to do the course part-time, in which case it will take longer. Training combines theory and practice. Budding nurses have 2,100 hours of classroom instruction at a vocational school. In addition, they spend 2,500 hours working in a hospital or nursing home, learning their profession under real life conditions. By the end of their course they have to pass a state examination. From 2020 onwards all the different nursing and care professions — e.g. geriatric, nursing and paediatric care will be trained together for the first two years; third year they can choose an area to specialise.



Study Nursing in Germany

With the global population growth rate is on a decline, most countries face various problems of an aging population. The low number of working-age people in a country not only affects the economic growth, but also influences the quality of welfare and healthcare of the older population. Germany is one of the top 10 countries in the world with a large population is over the age of 65. According to estimates, the nursing sector in Germany will need 40,000 new nurses by 2025. It is not surprising that the country is actively recruiting nurses from abroad to look after their citizens who are in their golden ages. If you have already gone through a nursing education or you are a nurse looking to work in Germany, you will be able to do so after going through an "Anerkennung", a recognition process of your professional qualification & passing it. If you like to become a nurse in Germany, there are several paths that you can choose from.

For foreign nurses to work in Germany as a nurse, they must undergo an apprenticeship, where you work 2,500 hours of practical training in hospitals and study at the same time for 2,100 hours of theoretical knowledge. During apprenticeship, you can expect to earn about \leq 1040 a month, which will then increase in the next few years to \leq 1,200 a month. If you wish to study nursing in Germany, there are several universities and vocational schools that offer this and can be completed within three years. In the last years of the degree, you can choose the specialization most suitable to you such as ICU nurse, nurse anaesthetist, oncology nurse, psychiatric nurse, ward manager and much more.
